Pursuant to House Rule 25, clause 5(d)(2), the Committee on Ethics hereby approves your and your spouse's proposed trip to the Republic of Korea, scheduled for April 28 to May 4, 2018, sponsored by the U.S. Association of Former Members of Congress, with financial support from the Korea Society.

You must complete a Member/Officer Post-Travel Disclosure Form and file it, together with a Sponsor Post-Travel Disclosure Form completed by the trip sponsor, with the Clerk of the House within 15 days after your return from travel. As part of that filing, you are also required to attach a copy of this letter and both the Traveler and Primary Trip Sponsor Forms (including attachments) you previously submitted to the Committee in seeking pre-approval for this trip. You must also report all travel expenses totaling more than \$390 from a single source on the "Travel" schedule of your annual Financial Disclosure Statement covering this calendar year. Finally, Travel Regulation § 404(d) also requires you to keep a copy of all request forms and supporting information provided to the Committee for three subsequent Congresses from the date of travel.

Because the trip may involve meetings with foreign government representatives, we note that House Members may accept, under the Foreign Gifts and Decorations Act (FGDA), gifts "of minimal value [currently \$390] tendered as a souvenir or mark of courtesy" by a foreign government. Any tangible gifts valued in excess of minimal value received from a foreign government must, within 60 days of acceptance, be disclosed on a Form for Disclosing Gifts from Foreign Governments filed with the Committee, and either turned over to the Clerk of the House, or, with the written approval of the Committee, retained for official use.

Dear Colleague:

On behalf of FMC, we're pleased to announce the creation of our newest Study Group, The Congressional Study Group on Korea (CSGK). We would like to invite you and your spouse to participate in our inaugural U.S. Congressional Member Study Tour to South Korea. The 2018 Member Study Tour to South Korea is scheduled to take place from April 28 – May 5, travelling to Seoul.

The Congressional Study Groups have a 30 year history of successful, high-level, discussion-driven study tours for Members of Congress and senior staff, complementing an active calendar of year-round programs on Capitol Hill. Fervently non-partisan and non-advocacy, our model promotes active, substantive discussion among all principals. We avoid formal speeches and presentations that hinder development of lasting working relationships based on mutual respect and understanding.

During our inaugural study tour to Korea, you and your colleagues will have the opportunity to engage with lawmakers, academics, and business representatives who have a wide range of perspectives on the U.S.-Korea relationship. The delegation will visit the DMZ on the North Korean border. Issues covered in the program include:

- Korean Penninsula
- Regional Relations (China, Japan, South East Asia)
- Trade and the Economy (KORUS, FDI)
- Timely Topics (New Administration, Demographic Change, the 2018 Olympics)

During the trip, we expect an agenda that includes meeting with President Moon and several of his ministers; visits to the headquarters or production facility of a large Korean multi-national company (for instance Samsung, LG, Hyundai or others.); roundtable discussions with American journalists in Korea and subject matter experts, and a tour of Chang-duk Palace, as well as other cultural institutions.

We have funding for eight Members and a limited number of spouses and we will provide business-class airfare. All lodging and scheduled meal costs will be paid for by FMC, a congressionally-chartered, 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, with the support of the Korea Society. Please note that all participation is available on a first-come, first-served basis for a diverse, bipartisan delegation. This privately-sponsored travel will be submitted to the Ethics Committee.

This study tour is intended for current Members of the United States Congress; FMC invited Members of the House of Representatives and Senate who have previously expressed interest in South Korea and U.S.-Korea relations in particular, security, energy, trade, and social issues and serve on committees relevant to the trip's issue areas. Please find enclosed a list of all participants.
- 12. The Congressional Study Group on Korea, established in 2018, is one of four legislative exchange programs conducted by the U.S. Association of Former Members of Congress (FMC). The Study Group aims to create constant channels of communication and dialogue between American legislators and their counterparts in South Korea through regular roundtables in Washington, DC, throughout the year in addition to trips such as the 2018 U.S. Congressional Member Study Tour to Korea. FMC's Congressional Study Group on Korea is responsible for organizing the seminar program, arranging meetings, and inviting expert speakers to the study tour. FMC is solely responsible for all invitations to and communications with trip participants, as well as the budget for the 2018 U.S. Congressional Member Study Tour to Korea.

15. b. 2) Seoul is the financial and political hub of South Korea, and the delegation will meet with high-level government officials, journalists and issue experts on issues ranging from security, trade and economy. The delegation will also visit the DMZ, Korean Demilitarized Zone, to learn the history and prospect between North Korea and South Korea relationship, a pertinent issue for the U.S. national security. Visits to plants of multinational companies such as Hyundai or Samsung, will allow the delegation to discuss innovation and technology issues.

Addendum:

Question 8:

This trip with a bipartisan delegation, will help enhance the understanding of the issues impacting US-Korea relations as it relates to trade, energy and national security. Planned meetings with South Korean legislators and issue experts in their country will help further dialogue on how our countries can work together and build our relationship in this critical part of the world. In addition, visits to the DMZ and meetings will help inform decisions as it relates to the prospect between North Korea and South Korea and US national security.

#6 Addendum

My travel to Korea with three of my Democratic colleagues and one other Republican colleague allowed us to gain a better understanding of the national security issues faced by both South Korea and our nation due to the threats from North Korea. In addition, we focused on the economic relationship between our two countries.

During the visit I met with the Mayor of Seoul where we learned about the operation of their city of 10 million and their relationships with the United States. I also met with elected South Korean counterparts to discuss the prospect of having a meaningful agreement with North Korea and the shared goal of denuclearization of that country.

Other meetings involved executives from Samsung and Hyundai where we discussed trade and their business relationships in New York including Plug Power and Samsung operations in the Albany area.
