#### Addendum - Primary Trip Sponsor Form

#### Item 4. Representative Ted Budd:

Representative Ted Budd represents North Carolina's 13<sup>th</sup> Congressional District and is currently serving in his first term. Rep. Budd serves on the House Financial Services Committee and three of its subcommittees: Housing, Community Development & Insurance; Consumer Protection and Financial Institutions; and Diversity and Inclusion. In visiting Missouri's 1<sup>st</sup> Congressional District, Rep Budd will engage with issues relevant to his committee assignments and his representational duties to NC-13, as well as issues of critical national importance that regularly come before Congress. He will also gain perspective on the needs and interests of a mostly urban congressional district, which contrasts with NC-13's mix of urban, suburban, and rural areas.

Issues important to Rep. Budd, such as financial services, housing and urban development, local economic development, and agriculture and scientific research, are also of great importance to MO-1 and will be on display throughout the trip. For example, civic and business leaders in Ferguson will discuss the community's recent revitalization and job creation efforts. Related to federal health care policy, Rep. Budd will visit the Lacy Clay Center for Children's Health, a part of one of the largest federally qualified health centers in the country. Further, there will be a visit to the National Geospatial Intelligence Agency, a critical component of the national security apparatus. This visit will provide a greater understanding of the agency's mission and operations, as well as a briefing from staff on key national security issues. North Carolina is also home to significant agricultural interests, and Rep. Budd will visit a cutting edge research facility where teams focus research at the nexus of food, energy and the environment to improve the productivity and sustainability of agriculture.

Curtis Kalin: Curtis Kalin serves as Rep. Budd's communications director. In many of the same ways that the meetings and site visits on this trip will further Rep. Budd's understanding of critical issues for his district and the nation, so too will they further Kalin's understanding of these critical issues and enhance his ability to support Rep. Budd in his representational capacities. Kalin will gain a deeper understanding of financial services, housing and urban development, local economic development, intelligence and national security, and agriculture and scientific research. Because Kalin's role involves supporting Rep. Budd in a communications function across all policy areas, each of these and more are relevant to his official duties.

The two members will meet with representatives of the National Park Service to learn about The Gateway Arch and how it reflects St. Louis' role in the Westward Expansion of the United States during the nineteenth century. The park is a memorial to Thomas Jefferson's role in opening the West, to the pioneers who helped shape its history, and to Dred Scott who sued for his freedom in the Old Courthouse. The arch itself, designed by Ero Saarinen, is the world's tallest arch, and the tallest man-made monument in the Western Hemisphere. A few years ago, a new visitors center, museum, and park/plaza were built, with a combination of federal, state, local, and private funding. This created a continuous public park over I-70 that lets visitors walk uninterrupted from the historic Old Courthouse to the Arch. The park's landscape has changed markedly over the last few years, as new features have been rolled out. They extend from the playfully remade Kiener Plaza, a civic gathering spot just west of the Old Courthouse, to the banks of the Mississippi, where a riverfront boulevard was raised slightly to reduce flooding and bike lanes were installed.

### 6:00-6:45 Walking tour of Kiener Plaza, Ballpark Village, downtown plazas.

The remade spaces of the plazas that extend west from the Mississippi River, respect the curving geometry of the original Arch grounds, even as they introduce user-friendly tweaks. The projects can be deemed a major success in its reinvention of a historic landscape and the connections it forges between that landscape and the surrounding city. The landscape architecture reshaped the urban conditions and expectations for downtown St. Louis. Kiener Plaza is a gathering spot for downtown workers and visitors. Ballpark Village is a dining, residential, office, retail, and entertainment district owned by the investment group that controls the St. Louis Cardinals baseball team. It was meant to compliment Busch Stadium, which opened in 2006. Financing of Ballpark Village has been a public/private venture. Rep. Budd's congressional district has also used public financing including federal historic tax credits, Community Development Block Grants, and HOME Investment Partnership Program funding to launch residential and commercial projects in Greensboro.
