Item 4: Representative Joe Cunningham:

Congressman Cunningham (SC-01) represents South Carolina's Lowcountry, including Charleston, Mt. Pleasant, Kiawah, and Hilton Head.

He serves on the House Natural Resources Committee and the House Veterans' Affairs Committee. Among other issues, the Committee on Natural Resources oversees federal conversation programs and establishes renewable energy sources. Rep. Cunningham also serves on the Waters, Oceans, and Wildlife Natural Resources Subcommittee, which oversees the implementation of laws managing domestic fisheries and other marine resources, and the Energy and Mineral Resources Subcommittee.

Congressman Cunningham will have the opportunity to meet with local commercial fishermen in KY-01. He will also tour a dam in the district with respect to hydropower which relates to both of his subcommittees. Both Kentucky and South Carolina are served by the same electric grid. Rep. Cunningham will also have the opportunity to explore transportation and commerce issues on the Ohio River. His committee assignment involves balancing inland waterway commercial needs while also protecting ecosystems and growing the outdoor recreation economy.

The congressman will also be interested in the tourism aspects of a number of the visits slated for KY-01, given the strong impact of tourism in his home district. Additionally, all the visits will give Rep. Cunningham an opportunity to see and understand firsthand how a nearby state is coping with the challenges of Covid-19, across a number of sectors and industries.

Asian carp, which are found in the Cumberland and Tennessee Rivers in the Kentucky First Congressional District, were first introduced by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) in 1963 as a way to control aquatic weeds and phytoplankton. Unfortunately, due to flooding and accidental releases, the carp, with no natural predators, have reproduced exponentially, feeding on the bottom of the food chain. They pose a tremendous threat to native fish and the natural ecosystems of these bodies of water, and the economies that depend on those fish.

Working with federal agencies like the USFWS, U.S. Geological Survey, U.S. Forest Service, and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers as well as the Kentucky Dept. of Fish and Wildlife Resources, solutions have been developed that are making an impact on the growth of Asian carp. These include commercial solutions which involve harvesting with nets and enhancing the carp processing business; and recreational solutions involving carp fishing tournaments, often with bows.

Rep. Cunningham serves on the Waters, Oceans, and Wildlife Natural Resources Subcommittee, which oversees the implementation of laws managing domestic fisheries and other marine resources. Rep. Cunningham will be introduced to local commercial fishermen and then they will take a tour by boat led by Lyon County Executive Judge Wade White.

During the era of segregation, the Hotel Metropolitan in Paducah was a safe haven for traveling African Americans not welcome in lodging elsewhere. The hotel became known for hosting musical legends like Louis Armstrong, Ella Fitzgerald, Ray Charles and Billie Holliday. Reps. Cunningham and Comer will walk through the same doors today to gain a better understanding of the struggles traveling African Americans faced, and learn how this welcoming place not only provided guests a bed, but also "a front door dignity". Hotel Director Betty Dobson will lead the brief tour and meeting at this historic landmark which is being renovated. The two congressmen will compare the strategies being undertaken in Charleston, SC and Paducah that focus on the African-American experience in their respective cities.

Drive to Barge & Ohio River operations.

River transportation and commerce is a major part of the Western KY economy along the Oho River. More than 20 barge companies have their operating or corporate headquarters in Paducah. The city is at the center of waterways linking Pittsburgh, Mobile, the Gulf of Mexico, New Orleans, St. Louis and Minneapolis/St. Paul. Only New Orleans has a bigger inland river presence. With access to four navigable rivers, Paducah is considered a national hub for river transport. It is the only port facility that is located where four major eastern rivers converge in America's heartland. Located at the confluence of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, the Ohio River and the Cumberland River, the Port is less than 50 miles from the Mississippi River.

In 2017, the city of Paducah opened a 340-foot transient boat dock that provides space for transient boaters to tie up for a few hours or several nights, increasing tourism in the city. Amenities include fuel (diesel and marine grade gasoline), water, power pedestals, and a sewer pumpout station.

Reps. Cunningham and Comer will meet with leaders at the Crounse Corporation. Since 1948, Crounse Corporation has been a leader in the river transportation industry. Today, it employs over 300 people, operate a fleet of 34 towboats and over 1100 barges, and transport over 30 million tons of cargo each year along the U.S. Inland Waterways. Crounse has become one of the largest carriers of dry bulk commodities on the inland river system.

Rep. Cunningham's appointment to the Natural Resources Waters, Oceans, and Wildlife Subcommittee involves balancing inland waterway commercial needs while also protecting ecosystems and growing the outdoor recreation economy. Rep. Comer is the ranking member of the House Oversight and Reform Environment Subcommittee, which works to make sure federal monies slated for inland waterway improvements are efficiently spent and meet their objectives.

> Kentucky crafts 95% of the world's supply of bourbon and is an \$8.5 billion industry generating 17,500 jobs with an annual payroll of \$800 million. Silver Brigade opened in 2014 and became the first distillery in Paducah since before Prohibition, when the town had more than 14 distilleries. The wheat style whiskey uses a manufacturing process of producing the bourbon using a 1930's era mill and exemplifies the growing craft component of bourbon making.

Reps. Cunningham and Comer will discuss the ramifications of the recent tax bills on the spirits industry, and will view the company's new hand sanitizer operation for which there continues to be high demand. In addition, the two members will learn about the traditions as well as the new technologies being employed by Silver Brigade

Item 12: Bipartisan Policy Center: The Bipartisan Policy Center is a non-profit organization that combines the best ideas from both parties to promote health, security, and opportunity for all Americans. BPC drives principled and politically viable policy solutions through the power of rigorous analysis and painstaking negotiation.

As a Washington, D.C.-based think tank that actively promotes bipartisanship, BPC works to address the key challenges facing the nation. Our policy solutions are the product of informed deliberations by former elected and appointed officials, business and labor leaders, and academics and advocates who represent both ends of the political spectrum. We are currently focused on such issues as health, energy, national security, the economy, financial regulatory reform, housing, immigration, infrastructure, and governance.

- Once they listen to each other, they often learn they actually have more in common than meets the eye and if they can see each other in that vein, impactful legislation can be achieved.
- A shared experience based on close interaction can be what brings Members of Congress together to take action on behalf of the American people.

The central goal of ACE is to build connections and trust, which will create conditions for intentional negotiation and compromise on issues of importance to the participants' constituencies as well as the nation. The trips will increase mutual understandings, and further collaboration on policy matters and legislation. Additionally, as a result, Congress will operate more effectively. BPC representative will accompany traveler on the trip to provide logistics and coordinate functioning of meetings, events, and site visits.

Square One Foundation (Grantmaking Trip Sponsor): Square One is a Chicago-based foundation focused on economic development, education, and Congressional reform issues. It takes a specific interest in finding ways for Members of Congress to engage in bipartisan activities. Square One will play no role in organizing or conducting the trip.

The congressional district KY-01 affords Congressman Cunningham a variety of learning opportunities relevant to his home district and his committee assignments. Natural resources, energy, tourism, and the need for economic development are among the features of KY-01 that are analogous to SC-01.

As noted above, Congressman Cunningham will have the opportunity to meet with local commercial fishermen, tour a dam in the district with respect to hydropower, see transportation and commerce issues firsthand on the Ohio River, and gain perspectives on economic development challenges and innovations.

Also as referenced, this trip should be among the first opportunities Congressman Cunningham has to see and hear what is working, and where the challenges remain, with respect to local renewal, reopening and rebuilding following the Covid-19 closures. He will be able to learn any innovative approaches that local chambers of commerce are instituting, as well as determine any shared areas between the two districts where significant gaps in assistance remain.

Visited Rep. Comer in Kentucky, June 18 – 20. Arrived to Nashville the afternoon of June 18, drove to Kuttawah, KY and had dinner with Rep. Comer at Hu-B's followed by a Boat Tour to see Asian Carp. On June 19, drove to Madisonville Community College, then drove to TVA Kentucky Dam. We toured the dam and learned about it. We then drove to Paducah for lunch at the Paducah Chamber of Commerce. We then toured downtown Paducah. We then drove to the historic Hotel Metropolitan and talked to them for a bit. We then visited the Barge and Ohio River operations center and learned about their issues. We then drove to the Silent Brigade Distillery and saw how they had converted their distillery into a hand sanitizer operation. Rep. Comer and his staff attended throughout.
