Dear Colleague:

This responds to your letter (Letter) dated April 16, 2024, seeking retroactive approval to accept travel expenses you and your spouse incurred in connection with a privately-sponsored trip to Bellagio, Italy, from April 1 to 6, 2024, sponsored by the Aspen Institute, Inc. (Aspen), and the Rockefeller Foundation. Subject to the guidance below, the Committee grants your request for retroactive approval.

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

According to your Letter and additional information provided to Committee counsel, the background on this matter is as follows. You represent the 2nd District of Florida. You were invited by and accepted travel from Aspen to attend an educational trip related to your official duties. According to the information you provided, Aspen provided you and your spouse with roundtrip, business class transportation to Milan, Italy, from Washington, DC, and meals and lodging in Bellagio, Italy, from April 1 to 6, 2024 (Trip). Trip expenses for you and your spouse totaled approximately \$15,277. You did not receive prior approval from the Committee to accept the Trip.

Despite not having received an approval letter from the Committee prior to your departure, you and your spouse did go on the Trip at Aspen's expense. The Committee was alerted to this issue on April 12, 2024, by Aspen. Aspen informed Committee staff that as they were preparing post-travel documents, they realized that they never provided your office with the Primary Trip Sponsor Form required for you to initiate the Committee's travel approval process. Aspen explained that they extended a last-minute invitation to you and your spouse for the Trip and that in their rush to facilitate your travel, they neglected to provide your office with the requisite form and did not inform the Committee that you and your spouse would attend the Trip. On Monday, April 15, 2024, Committee staff confirmed with your office that you and your spouse accepted the Trip and that you did not request or receive the Committee's approval prior to your travel. Committee staff advised your staff that you could use principal campaign funds or personal funds to reimburse Aspen for the Trip expenses or that you would need to seek retroactive approval to accept the Trip expenses from Aspen.

In your Letter, you state that you were unable to seek the Committee's preauthorization for travel because Aspen did not provide your office with pre-travel documents prior to your travel. Your office explained that your staff's inexperience in planning privately-sponsored travel also contributed to this error. Your office reviewed the incident and has taken steps to prevent future issues by reviewing the House Ethics Manual, requiring your scheduler to develop standard operating procedures and checklists for all types of Member travel, and implementing pre-travel communication requirements among your senior staff to ensure timely notice to the Committee.

LEGAL BACKGROUND AND ANALYSIS

House Rule 25, clause 5(d)(2) requires that Members and staff request and receive approval from the Committee *before* accepting privately-sponsored travel connected to one's official duties. You did not receive approval from the Committee to accept the above-noted privately-sponsored travel before you and your spouse embarked on this Trip.

In general, the Committee will not approve a privately-sponsored trip in a case in which a House traveler failed to obtain permission to travel from the Committee before embarking on the trip. In exceptional circumstances, the Committee may consider approving a previously unapproved trip after the trip has taken place.

Based on the representations in your Letter and additional information provided to Committee counsel, the Committee chooses to exercise its discretion under these circumstances. Specifically, this Trip otherwise complied with House rules. In addition, once you became aware of the error, you took timely steps to try to ensure that a similar situation would not occur in the future. Finally, Committee records indicate that you have not previously accepted travel from a private source without prior approval of the Committee. As a result, the Committee approves your request for retroactive approval for your and your spouse's trip to Italy from April 1 to 6, 2024, sponsored by Aspen.

However, we note that retroactive travel approval may be inappropriate for you or your office in the future. This letter serves as a reminder to you of the House Rule requiring you to receive explicit Committee approval *before* you accept privately-sponsored travel.

You should submit your Post-Travel Disclosure to the Clerk of the House, substituting this letter for the Committee pre-approval required by House rules. If you have already made a partial disclosure to the Clerk, you should add this letter as an amendment to that submission.

Because you are required to file an annual financial disclosure statement under the Ethics in Government Act (EIGA) for 2024, you must report the value of all trip expenses, including food, lodging, and transportation, exceeding \$480, that were paid for by a source other than a federal, state, or local government, or relative, on Schedule H ("Travel Payments and Reimbursements") of that statement. Trips valued at less than \$480 do not trigger the disclosure requirement. That disclosure would have to include the identity of the trip sponsor; the dates of

the trip; the cities of departure, destination, and return; whether you were accompanied by a family member; and whether you were provided food and lodging.

LIMITATIONS

The response above constitutes an advisory opinion concerning the application of House Rule 25 and the EIGA. The following limitations apply to this opinion:

- This advisory opinion is issued only to Representative Neal P. Dunn, the requestor of this opinion. This advisory opinion cannot be relied upon by any other individual or entity.
- This advisory opinion is limited to the current provisions and interpretation of the
 House rule and federal statute specifically noted above. No opinion is expressed or
 implied herein regarding the application of any other federal, state, or local statute, rule,
 regulation, ordinance, or other law that may be applicable to the proposed conduct
 described in this letter.
- This advisory opinion will not bind or obligate any entity other than the Committee on Ethics of the United States House of Representatives.
- This advisory opinion is limited in scope to the specific proposed conduct described in this letter, the specific facts represented to the Committee, and the understanding of those facts to the extent indicated in this letter and does not apply to any other conduct or facts, including that which appears similar in nature or scope to that described in this letter. Should this letter misstate any facts in this matter, the opinion and advice may no longer apply, and you should inform the Committee as soon as possible to determine if the advice and opinion in this letter apply to the accurate factual basis.

The Committee will take no adverse action against you in regard to any conduct that you undertake, or have undertaken, in good faith reliance upon this advisory opinion, so long as you have presented a complete and accurate statement of all material facts relied upon herein, and the proposed conduct in practice conforms with the information you provided, as addressed in this opinion.

Changes or other developments in the law (including, but not limited to, the Code of Official Conduct, House rules, Committee guidance, advisory opinions, statutes, regulations, or case law) may affect the analysis or conclusions drawn in this advisory opinion. The Committee reserves the right to reconsider the questions and issues raised in this advisory opinion and to rescind, modify, or terminate this opinion if required by the interests of the House. However, the Committee will rescind an advisory opinion only if relevant and material facts were not completely and accurately disclosed to the Committee at the time the opinion was issued. In the event that this advisory opinion is modified or terminated, the Committee will not take any adverse action against you with respect to any action taken in good faith reliance upon this advisory opinion so long as such conduct or such action was promptly discontinued upon notification of the modification or termination of this advisory opinion.
