Addendum – Primary Trip Sponsor Form

Item 4

Congressman Scott Peters is a member of the following Committees: Energy and Commerce, and Budget. He is also a member of E&C's Energy Subcommittee.

This trip will afford Rep. Peters the opportunity to see a district that is very different than his coastal California district, but with interests and concerns that will overlap with his constituency and committee responsibilities – including energy, workforce development and issues important to working families, manufacturing, and the federal budget.

Visits will include a tour and discussion at Gentex Corporation and also a meeting at the Southwest Michigan First Chamber of commerce (in Kalamazoo), which will provide insights into economic growth and workforce issues as the pertain to federal laws, policy and regulation. An interactive conversation and engagement with BPC's federal budget simulator with a local Boys and Girls Club will facilitate conversation with young men and women about the budget and how the federal government functions, as well as feedback from the group regarding their views on future federal priorities. This is directly relevant to Rep. Peters' service on the House Budget Committee.

A visit to the Palisades Nuclear Power Plant will be an invaluable opportunity for Rep. Peters as a member of the Energy and Commerce Committee's Energy Subcommittee to learn about the very first nuclear reactor in the US, and possibly the world, to be re-started. A stop at the renowned Kellogg cereal manufacturing facility will include salient conversations about workforce-related topics as well as how federal policies impact large employers and national economic health.

Gentex is foremost a technology company with a wide range of core competencies and ability to fuse technologies. The company develops and manufactures high-tech electronic products for the automotive, aerospace, and commercial fire protection industries. Specifically, Rep. Peters will see the production of automotive digital vision, sensors, and dimming glass.

This visit will afford Rep. Peters the opportunity to experience a manufacturer that is a significant employer and contributor to the local economy. He will learn about issues such as workforce and supply-chain challenges, the use of technology, and how these dovetail or contrast with industries in his own district. These subjects relate to Rep. Peters' service on the Energy and Commerce Committee and the Congressional High Technology Caucus.

Holtec Palisades will be experiencing a “first” for the global nuclear power industry. This 800-megawatt facility, shut down in May 2022 with plans for decommissioning, is being prepared for re-powering with support from the State of Michigan and the US Department of Energy.

Getting Palisades back online is projected by supporters to give Michigan a clean, reliable, safe source of continued energy. It is expected to provide hundreds of jobs to the community, as well as extended economic benefits for the region.

The tour will include a discussion of how this decision was arrived at, what the implications are, and the challenges and opportunities it presents. This visit is directly relevant to Rep. Peters’ work and responsibilities on the Energy and Commerce Committee (and specifically the Energy Subcommittee) and membership on a number of related House caucuses.

Rep. Scott Peters serves on the House Budget Committee, and he (along with Rep. Bill Huizenga) co-chair the Bipartisan Fiscal Forum. This visit will be a discussion between them and young men and women about the significance of the federal budget, the challenges faced and how decisions on spending and revenue will impact their futures.

It will also be an opportunity for the Boys and Girls Club members to engage with the Bipartisan Policy Center’s Federal Budget Simulator tool. The tool invites users to explore the fiscal tradeoffs that drive the annual appropriations process, from energy innovation and education to health care, national defense, and Social Security. Participants can propose policy changes to tax revenues and government spending and see how such choices impact the deficit and long-term fiscal outlook. In

turn, Rep. Peters will learn from the participants about their concerns and priorities for the future.

Peters will be able to hear directly from area leaders on the frontlines of the area's economy, compare with the business community in his district, and apply lessons learned to his efforts on the House Energy and Commerce Committee.

Kellogg has been making cereal products since 1894 and is an anchor for the greater Battle Creek economy. As of 2026, WK Kellogg operates as a subsidiary of Ferrero, which officially finalized its \$3.1 billion acquisition of the cereal maker in Sept., 2025. The company remains headquartered in Battle Creek.

WK Kellogg employs approximately 850 people in Battle Creek. Historically, the BC plant had a capacity of 30,000 cases per day. As of 2025, the company's total North American sales volume makes it a market leader with a 28 percent share of the ready-to-eat cereal market.

The discussion and tour will center on the major drivers, opportunities and concerns for large US businesses, the impact on the local and US economy, and workforce issues including

availability of employees and making jobs more accessible for working families.

This visit will provide Rep. Peters with an opportunity to learn more about this major economic driver, how federal policies impact the corporation and larger US employers in general, and opportunities and challenges in the US workforce.

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Item 12: *Bipartisan Policy Center*: The Bipartisan Policy Center is a non-profit organization that combines the best ideas from both parties to promote health, security, and opportunity for all Americans. BPC drives principled and politically viable policy solutions through the power of rigorous analysis and painstaking negotiation.

As a Washington, D.C.-based think tank that actively promotes bipartisanship, BPC works to address the key challenges facing the nation. Our policy solutions are the product of informed deliberations by former elected and appointed officials, business and labor leaders, and academics and advocates who represent both ends of the political spectrum. We are currently focused on such issues as health, energy, national security, the economy, financial regulatory reform, housing, immigration, infrastructure, and governance.

While a healthy, civil debate among those with differing viewpoints is an essential component of our democracy, the current partisan tone in government is impeding progress. BPC is focused on how to overcome political divides and help make our government work better. Regardless of deep policy disagreements, Congress must operate with mutual respect, decency, and civility which are foundational to forging collaborative solutions. - To develop trust, Members of Congress must listen to one another to understand what it is that motivates them and concerns them.
- Once they listen to each other, they often learn they actually have more in common than meets the eye – and if they can see each other in that vein, impactful legislation can be achieved.
- A shared experience based on close interaction can be what brings Members of Congress together to take action on behalf of the American people.

The central goal of ACE is to build connections and trust, which will create conditions for intentional negotiation and compromise on issues of importance to the participants' constituencies as well as the nation. The trips will increase mutual understandings, and further collaboration on policy matters and legislation. Additionally, as a result, Congress will operate more effectively. BPC devises and arranges the visits during the trip, arranges travel, and BPC representatives will accompany traveler on the trip to provide logistics and coordinate functioning of meetings, events, and site visits.

Newton D. and Rochelle F. Becker Foundation (Grantmaking Trip Sponsor): The Foundation supports non-profits engaged in policy areas in which the Foundation has an interest. Giving is focused in five priority areas including supporting democratic values. The Foundation plays no role in organizing, planning or conducting the trip.

Again, as outlined above under Item 4 and in the itinerary in Item 10, the trip to MI-4 will be focused on several areas that will be of interest to Rep. Peters and directly connected to his official responsibilities and the interests of his constituents: energy, workforce development and issues important to working families, manufacturing, and the federal budget.

Specifically, MI-4 provides a number of opportunities to explore these issues in a region that is significantly different from CA-50 geographically and politically but also shares interests in the above issues. Rep. Peters should be able to derive lessons from seeing contrasting approaches, as well as potentially confirmation of the value of practices that are being similarly (and effectively) applied in both regions. This will help Rep. Peters as he formulates policy positions and legislation.
