The subject matter of the trip is directly connected to the mission of the organization. The Alliance to Save Energy promotes energy efficiency worldwide to achieve a healthier economy, a cleaner environment and energy security. To achieve this mission, the Alliance:

- b) 2) There are several reasons why we have chosen Los Angeles, California as the destination for this trip.
 - The American Council for an Energy-Efficiency Economy (ACEE) produces the annual State Energy Efficiency Scorecard, which ranks states based on energy efficiency policies and practices. California has consistently ranked in the top 2 it is #2 in 2017 after being tied for #1 in 2016 and has always been at the forefront of progressive energy efficiency policy. California has a long history of adopting energy efficiency policy and was the first state to do so in many instances, including building energy codes and appliance/equipment standards. In addition, the state requires or incentivizes energy efficiency throughout many sectors like schools, commercial buildings, state-owned buildings and residential buildings. California also has enabled property assessed clean energy (PACE) financing to help encourage home and business owners to invest in energy efficiency. In addition to the state ranking, ACEEE also ranks a selection of major cities on the same criteria and Los Angeles, CA was ranked #4 in 2017. Therefore, Los Angeles, CA is an excellent option for such a trip because we can incorporate strong local level actions along with the broader state-level actions.
 - The Alliance to Save Energy is also hosting a public briefing at the La Kretz Innovation Campus on Friday, February 23, 2018. The title of the event is entitled, "California: Leading the Future." A full agenda is included below (as it currently stands).
 - The Los Angeles area boasts a wide range of field examples and opportunities to learn about energy efficiency, including:
 - Meritage Home Builders
 - Meritage Homes is a real-estate development company that constructs single-family detached homes in states throughout the country. It separates itself from its competitors by placing a significant emphasis on energy efficiency and offers clients many energy efficiency options to allow them to customize the home to fit their specific needs. Meritage Homes was recognized as an ENERGY STAR Partner of the Year in Sustained Excellence for 2017 and has earned this distinction every year since 2013.
 - o Lutron Experience Center
 - Lutron is a lighting control and sensor company that is best known for mass marketing the classic lighting dimmer that can be seen in many homes and businesses. It is also the only company that integrates lighting controls and motorized window shades with daylighting systems to control both electric light and natural sunlight. These technologies can lead to

large energy efficiency gains that, if integrated correctly, can significantly reduce lighting-associated energy costs. The Lutron Experience Center allows visitors to see these applications in a real-world setting.

o Port of Long Beach

The Port of Long Beach is one of the world's busiest seaports with significant economic benefits to the region and the entire country. Due to its size, the Port of Long Beach has a high energy demand and is working to address it through rebate programs to incentivize tenants to become more energy-efficient, investing in renewable energy technologies and energy storage, and incorporating advanced energy management technologies to manage energy demand.

SloanLED – Microsoft/LA Live Theater

SloanLED is a producer of high-quality lighting products, particularly in LED lighting technology, with applications for exterior signage, canopies, shelves and refrigerated displays, among others.
