

The subject matter of the trip is directly connected to the mission of the organization. The Alliance to Save Energy promotes energy efficiency worldwide to achieve a healthier economy, a cleaner environment and energy security. To achieve this mission, the Alliance:

- Leads worldwide energy efficiency initiatives in policy advocacy, research, education, technology deployment and communications that impact all sectors of the economy.

- Provides vision and activism which includes active and engaged members of Congress, leaders from business, the public interest sector and academia.
- Initiates and participates in public-private partnerships, collaborate efforts and strategic alliances to optimize resources and expand its sphere of influence.
- Executes its mission through a team of recognized energy efficiency experts and professionals.

The purpose of this trip is to learn about policies and best practices that are helping to drive advances in energy productivity across the country. Our hope is that through visits to sites identified on the itinerary and through meetings with local and state officials that the Congressional staff members will be able to learn about state and business activities and, in turn, use that new knowledge to develop, refine and advance policies at the federal level.

b) 2) There are several reasons why we have chosen Seattle, Washington as the destination for this trip.

- The American Council for an Energy-Efficient Economy (ACEEE) produces the annual State Energy Efficiency Scorecard, which ranks states based on energy efficiency policy and practices. Washington state is one of the national leaders for energy efficiency and was ranked #7 in 2017, an improvement of one spot from the 2016 report. At the state level, Washington is one of the best when it comes to building energy efficiency policies and state government initiatives. Within the built environment, Washington continues to be at the leading edge of building energy efficiency codes for both commercial and residential buildings. The state government also has a long list of initiatives that are advancing energy efficiency, spanning state-owned facilities, transportation, research and development, and performance contracting. In addition to the state ranking, ACEEE also ranks a selection of major cities on the same criteria and Seattle, WA was ranked #3 out of 51 ranked cities. At the city level, Seattle has in place a goal to reduce municipal energy use by 20 percent by 2020 from a 2008 baseline. In order to achieve this goal, Seattle has implemented policies like building benchmarking to improve the efficiency of the built environment, encouraging utilities to incentivize reductions in consumption and addressing improvements in the transportation sector through enhanced regional planning. Therefore, Seattle is one of the best places to visit to learn about both state and local policies that are driving advances in energy efficiency.
- Seattle boasts a wide range of field examples and opportunities to learn about energy efficiency, including:
  - Amazon
    - Amazon is an e-commerce and cloud computing company that has grown into the largest Internet retailer in the world. As Amazon continues to grow and diversify, it has incorporated new technologies throughout its operations to reduce its energy consumption and has also applied artificial intelligence and other processes to identify additional areas of improvement. Amazon has a significant footprint and a unique set of

- operational issues that it has addressed in innovative ways and it is now working on new approaches that will help others reach the same level of efficiency.
- Microsoft
    - Microsoft is a multinational technology company that specializes in computer software, consumer electronics, personal computers and services. The company leads by example when it comes to energy efficiency and clean energy as it has adopted and incorporated key technologies to reduce its energy consumption and environmental impact. At the same time, Microsoft also helps others accomplish these goals by selling products and services that can help others become more energy efficient across a broad portfolio of applications.
  - Snohomish County Public Utility District
    - Snohomish County PUD is the second largest publicly owned utility in Washington with over 348,000 electric customers and 20,000 water customers. Snohomish PUD offers an extensive list of opportunities for its customers to help them become more energy efficient and supports those efforts by seeking to be as efficient as possible in its own buildings and facilities.
  - McKinstry Innovation Center
