The building at 221 5th Avenue North was built in the 1890s, opened as a Woolworth "five and dime" store in 1913. The building is a registered historic site as part of the Fifth Avenue Historic District in Nashville. The lunch counter at Woolworth opened in 1925. Since the Jim Crow laws of the 1890s prohibited African Americans from eating at these public lunch counters. As African American students attending college in Nashville sought to challenge this decades-old practice of segregation at lunch counters. On February 13, 1960, a group of mainly of college students from historically black universities Fisk University, American Baptist College and Tennessee

A & I, walked into the downtown locations of Woolworth, Kress and McClellan, sat down at the lunch counters and asked to be served, to no avail. Their goal was to desegregate Nashville lunch counters. On February 27, 1960 the student-led movement drew more than two hundred student protesters, leading to multiple arrests and national media attention. US Congressman John Lewis, first arrest took place while sitting in at the lunch counter on the first floor of this Woolworth.

Mr. David Steele Ewing, Esq. is a ninth-generation Nashville resident and direct descendant of Prince Albert Ewing, the first African American to practice law in Tennessee and a six time judge. Ewing attended Peabody Demonstration School from nursery school to the twelfth grade. In his undergraduate studies Ewing was on the rowing team at Connecticut College, from which he received his B.A. degree in 1985. Ewing later earned his J.D. degree from Vanderbilt University Law School in 1989.

In 1993, Ewing served as director of legal and government services for the Tennessee Higher Education Commission. Joining Gaylord Entertainment Company in 1999, Ewing served as director of government and community relations. In 2004, The Nashville Area Chamber of Commerce (NACC) announced the addition of Ewing to the organization's senior management team. Ewing, a 12-year government relations veteran, assumed the newly created role of senior vice president of government relations and community improvement. In this capacity, he directed programs and initiatives that bolstered five of the Chamber's eight strategic areas, including supporting the community commitment to education; supporting the development of a comprehensive regional transportation infrastructure; celebrating cultural diversity; assuring a vital downtown; and providing advocacy within the government.

Ewing served on the board of over twenty different civic organizations and businesses, including Capital Bank & Trust; Summit Medical Center; Cheekwood Museum of Art; the Nashville Opera; and Middle Tennessee Boys & Girls Club. Ewing is a collector of local African American history and culture. Ewing married noted Nashville author Alice Randall.

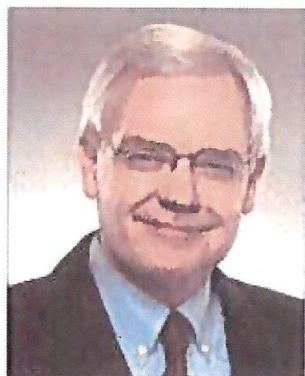

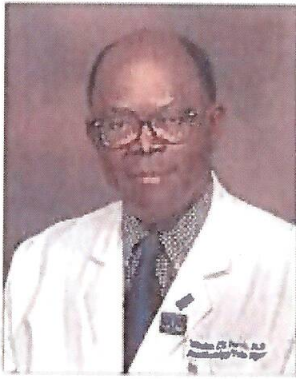

The Hon. Bob Clement Former U.S. Congressman Bob Clement, was an eight-term congressman from Tennessee's Fifth Congressional District from 1988 to 2003. He is the son of the late three-term Governor of Tennessee, Frank G. Clement. After graduating from the University of Tennessee with a Bachelor of Science Degree, and an MBA Degree from the University of Memphis, Clement, after completing an R.O.T.C program, was commissioned a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army. He served two years, then returned to Tennessee after his father passed away in a tragic automobile accident to take care of family matters. Clement continued his military service by serving in the Tennessee National Guard for twenty-nine years, eventually retiring as a colonel. Clement began his career in public service when he was only

twenty-nine years old when he ran for a seat on the Tennessee Public Service Commission and won. Later he was appointed as a director of the Tennessee Valley Authority by President Jimmy Carter. During his fifteen years in Congress, he served on the House Transportation Committee, improving infrastructure projects such as highways, public and mass transit, airport improvements and preserving waterways. While in Congress, Clement also served on the Foreign Affairs, Budget and Veteran's Affairs Committees. Clement founded and co-chaired the Education Caucus promoting and supporting more federal funds for public education. He helped found the New Democrat Caucus that concentrated on high-tech and trade issues. As an active member of the Tourism Caucus, he promoted trade and tourism at home and abroad. After leaving Congress, Clement formed Clement & Associates a public affairs consulting firm in Nashville, Tennessee. Clement, is also the author of the acclaimed political memoir, *Presidents, Kings and Convicts: My Journey from the Tennessee Governor's Residence to the Halls of Congress* and is a sought after public speaker. Clement's wife, Mary, served as president of the Congressional Club, which represents the spouses of the House and the Senate when her husband was in Congress. She was also Director of Consumer Affairs for the State of Tennessee. They are both life-long Tennesseans and residents of Nashville. They have four children and five grandchildren.



Winston C V Parris, MD. Dr Winston Parris, a native of St Lucia, was awarded a Government scholarship to study Medicine at the University of the West Indies in Jamaica in 1962 and he graduated in 1968 with a Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery Degree (MB.BS). After completing Internship and Residency in Anesthesia, he returned to St Lucia in 1971 and served with distinction as the only Consultant Anesthesiologist at Victoria Hospital for four and a half years. In 1975, he immigrated to the USA and completed a residency in Anesthesiology at Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tennessee. In 1977, he joined the Anesthesiology faculty and served in that capacity for 23 years rising through the ranks to become a full-tenured

Professor of Anesthesiology in 1989. Dr Parris developed an early interest in Pain Management and as early as 1979 recognized the major deficiency of Pain Management in USA in general and Tennessee in particular. He was a founding member of the American Academy of Pain Medicine, the American College of Pain Medicine, the American Board of Pain Medicine and the Tennessee Pain Society. He served as President of the American Board of Pain Medicine, American College of Pain Medicine, the Tennessee Pain Society, Leukemia Society of America-Tennessee Chapter and as Secretary of the American Academy of Pain Medicine. He also served as President of the World Society of Pain Clinicians for 6 years and during that time helped develop Pain Clinics in Africa, Latin America, the Caribbean, the Far East and Eastern Europe. Dr Parris founded the Vanderbilt Pain Control Center in 1982 and served as its Medical Director from 1982 to 1997. Dr Parris served on the Advisory Committee for Anesthesia, Pain and Life support Drugs of the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) from 1998 to 2002. Dr Parris went into Private Practice after the death of his late wife and became the CEO of Universal Anesthesia Care, Universal Management Anesthesia Company and Universal Pain Institute in Tampa, Florida. From 2003 to 2005, Dr Parris was the Director of Clinical Research at Anesthesia Pain Care Consultants in Fort Lauderdale. In July 2005, Dr Parris accepted the position as Professor of Anesthesia and Chief of the Pain Programs at Duke University Medical Center in Durham, North Carolina but continues to run the St Lucia Pain Institute and the St Luke's Clinic for the underprivileged in St Lucia. In August 2012, Dr Parris officially retired from clinical practice in the department of Anesthesiology at Duke University as Professor of Anesthesiology and Chief of the Pain Clinic and was appointed Professor Emeritus at Duke University Medical School.

Dr. Parris is married to Nelita (his first wife, Shirley is deceased) and he has 3 children; Wayne, Wendell and Sharon and 4 grandchildren.

Dr. Colvard has made significant

contributions to increasing the number of TVHS Veterans receiving medication assisted treatments for Opioid Use Disorder through the Psychotropic Drug Safety Initiative work group. She continues to work toward expanding access to evidence-based medication treatments for Veterans with Alcohol and Opioid Use Disorders.



Dr. Jessica Samples, MD, Board Certified in General Psychiatry, Consultation Liaison Psychiatry, Internal Medicine Acting Chief of Psychiatry, Tennessee Valley Healthcare System. Dr. Bonnie Miller MD, MMHC is the Senior Associate Dean for Health Sciences Education at Vanderbilt University School of Medicine (VUSM) and Executive Vice-President for Educational Affairs at Vanderbilt University Medical Center (VUMC). In these roles, she oversees all programs related to physician education, from the medical school admissions process to continuing professional development. In addition she oversees administration of the ten other degrees offered by VUSM, as well as the certificate programs offered by VUMC's Center for Programs in Allied Health.

With academic interests in the moral and professional development of physicians, curriculum change, and continuous learning in medicine, Dr. Miller is recognized as a senior leader in medical education. She guided VUSM through several cycles of curriculum innovation, and now consults and collaborates with other schools that seek to transform medical education. Dr. Miller was the Principle Investigator of the American Medical Association's Accelerating Change in Medical Education Grant, awarded to VUSM in June 2013. She now serves as co-investigator through the grant's continuation period. In addition, she is a founding member of National Transformation Network, a consortium of seven medical schools generously funded by the Kern Family Foundation to transform medical education through the triple aim of Character, Caring and Competence. Despite her administrative responsibilities, Dr. Miller remains engaged in teaching and mentoring. She directs "Foundations of the Profession," the first course taken by Vanderbilt medical students, which focuses on health equity and the social determinants of health. She also serves on multiple University and Medical Center committees related to learning and its intersection with the needs of the healthcare delivery system, a major focus of her current work.

After attending Colorado College for her undergraduate education, she received her MD degree at the University of Oklahoma. She completed post-graduate training in general surgery at Vanderbilt University Affiliated Hospitals, followed by a fellowship in hepato-biliary disease at the Virginia Mason Clinic in Seattle. She then returned to Nashville and eventually focused her clinical interests on patients with breast cancer. She is married to Robert Miller, a pulmonologist who serves as medical director of Vanderbilt's student-run free clinic. They have three children and two grandchildren.
