Item 4. Representative Xochitl Torres Small:

Representative Xochitl Torres Small represents New Mexico's 2nd Congressional District and she is currently serving in her first term. Rep. Torres Small serves on the House Armed Services Committee and Homeland Security Committee. Her district shares many commonalities with Wisconsin's 1st Congressional District, as well as differences that will provide her a more national insight into critical issues relevant to Congress.

Issues important to Rep. Torres Small, such as tourism, agriculture and food processing, advanced manufacturing, and distribution/logistics/transportation, are also of great importance to WI-1 and Rep Bryan Steil. Several visits on this trip will provide Rep. Torres Small a different perspective on those topics, including visits with the local tourism industry, farmers and food processors, and local manufacturing operations. Rep Torres Small has expressed an interest in innovative approaches to economic development, which will be on display in WI-1 during several visits with local businesses, many of which have a global reach. Consequently, these visits will also be relevant to trade and tariff policy, which has gained increasing attention from Congress during the current administration. Relevant to agriculture, NM-2, like WI-1, is home to vast dairy production, implicating federal agriculture policy.

Paloma Perez: Paloma Perez serves as Rep. Torres Small's communications director. In much the same ways that the meetings and site visits on this trip will further Rep.
