Dear Mr. Carrizales:

Pursuant to House Rule 25, clause 5(d)(2), the Committee on Ethics hereby approves your proposed trip to Guatemala, scheduled for January 12 to 16, 2024, sponsored by Chicago Religious Leadership Network on Latin America, Partnership for Participatory International Policy, Rincón Family Services, and Open Society Institute.

You must complete an Employee Post-Travel Disclosure Form (which your employing Member must also sign) and file it, together with a Sponsor Post-Travel Disclosure Form completed by the trip sponsor, with the Clerk of the House within 15 days after your return from travel. As part of that filing, you are also required to attach a copy of this letter and both the Traveler and Primary Trip Sponsor Forms (including attachments) you previously submitted to the Committee in seeking pre-approval for this trip. If you are required to file an annual Financial Disclosure Statement, you must also report all travel expenses totaling more than \$480 from a single source on the "Travel" schedule of your annual Financial Disclosure Statement covering this calendar year. Finally, Travel Regulation § 404(d) also requires you to keep a copy of all request forms and supporting information provided to the Committee for three subsequent Congresses from the date of travel.

Because the trip may involve meetings with foreign government representatives, we note that House employees may accept, under the Foreign Gifts and Decorations Act (FGDA), gifts "of minimal value [currently \$480] tendered as a souvenir or mark of courtesy" by a foreign government. Any tangible gifts valued in excess of minimal value received from a foreign government must, within 60 days of acceptance, be disclosed on a Form for Disclosing Gifts from Foreign Governments and either turned over to the Clerk of the House, or, with the written approval of the Committee, retained for official use.

l Please be aware that the Committee's review of the proposed trip does not extend to either the security situation in the destination country or security related to foreign travel in general. We recommend you contact the Office of House Security (OHS) for a safety and security briefing prior to your departure. OHS may be reached at (202) 226-2044 or ohsstaff@mail.house.gov. Esteemed Congresswoman Delia Ramírez,

As Co-Director of the Chicago Religious Leadership Network on Latin America (CRLN), I am honored to extend an invitation to Congresswoman Delia Ramírez to participate in a Human Rights delegation to Guatemala. I would also like to extend an invitation to her staffer Luis Carrizales, since he works on issues of foreign policy for the Congresswoman.

The purpose of this delegation is to facilitate crucial meetings between Congresswoman Ramírez and various stakeholders in Guatemala, including Indigenous groups, human rights defenders, and civil society organizations dedicated to advancing human rights. A central goal of the delegation is to attend the Presidential Inauguration of president elect Bernardo Arévalo, scheduled for January 14, 2024.

Over the last few months, CRLN has established ongoing communication with organizations, groups, and leaders within the Guatemalan community in Chicago. Among these groups is the Coalición Coordinadora Guatemalteca del Medio Oeste (Guatemalan Coordinating Coalition of the Midwest). These groups want to advocate for and support Congresswoman Ramírez's trip to Guatemala, recognizing the significance of her presence in engaging with individuals actively working towards the advancement of Human Rights.

On October 19, 2023, twelve organizations supported the Guatemala community of Chicago by organizing a peaceful demonstration outside the Guatemala Consulate in support of democracy in Guatemala. CRLN crafted a letter signed by the 12 organizations and was delivered to the Consulate General.

It is our belief that Congresswoman Delia Ramírez, given her leadership, can play a pivotal role in articulating to both the U.S. Congress and the American public the adverse consequences of perpetuating interventionist foreign policies toward Guatemala and the broader Central American region. These policies have notably contributed to political instability and continue to perpetuate corrupt governance, which minimally addresses the pressing humanitarian crisis related to migration.

The participation of Congresswoman Ramírez on this delegation holds the potential to amplify awareness and understanding of the complex interplay between foreign policies, regional stability, and migration challenges. We at CRLN hope that the Congresswoman will consider this invitation, recognizing the value of her presence and voice in this critical time for Guatemala.

 - ASDEJU was created for the defense and promotion of interests related to the sustainable development of children, adolescents and youth in general. In the western highlands of Guatemala, indigenous youth often lack economic opportunities and civic participation, contributing to weak community ties and often pushing them to leave their communities and immigrate to the US. ADESJU manages programs that provide life skills such as business entrepreneurship, leadership, reliability and public speaking, with the goal of keeping young people in school, avoiding drugs and not participating in gangs. This meeting will provide the delegates with first-hand information about the reasons unaccompanied minors are migrating to the US, and ASDEJU's social programming to support youth and children staying in Guatemala. The delegates will learn about the root causes of youth irregular migration from Guatemala. The effects of US foreign policies on outward migration, and Guatemalan-led initiatives to deter irregular youth migration.

 - Fundacion Ixtatan has created schools in Huehuetenango to improve access to
 quality education according to the economic and social context of a community.
 Huehuetenango has the highest number of unaccompanied minors migrating to
 the USA, especially Illinois. The majority are Mayan-Chuj Indigenous children
 who speak Chuj and very little Spanish. One of the reasons is because of the lack

of education available to the children. This meeting will provide the delegates with first-hand information about the reasons unaccompanied minors are migrating to the US, and Fundación Ixtatan's educational initiatives to curb this trend. The delegates will learn about the root causes of youth irregular migration from Guatemala, the effects of US foreign policies on outward migration, and Guatemalan-led initiatives to deter irregular youth migration.

 - O The Convergencia por los DDHH provides comprehensive support to human rights defenders to empower them in the management and self-management of their security. They have worked with El Estor, Izabal community coordinating an Observation and Verification Mission. They verified the general situation of compliance with guarantees for the full validity of Human Rights and the specific situation of attacks on Defenders in the El Estor area. The delegates will learn about the work of the Convergencia and hear first hand updates about the current situation in El Estor. This meeting will educate delegates about the effects of US development policies and practices on outward migration, and the potential impacts of the Chixoy International Financial Institution Reparations Act.

- 12:00 2:00 pm: Meeting with survivors from the **Chixoy Dam Massacre** [2]
 - The survivors of the Chixoy Dam Massacre demand resettlement and the reparations that the Government has promised for over twenty years. The hydroelectric project was initiated during the Guatemalan military dictatorship, and the violent civil war between 1976 and 1983. When community members from Rio Negro opposed relocation and sought better compensation, the army and paramilitary forces murdered 444 people, the majority of them women and children (facts later known as the Rio Negre massacre). In 2022, Representatives Jesús "Chuy" García (IL-04) and Jan Schakowsky (IL-09) introduced the Chixoy International Financial Institution Reparations Act. This bill would help create a

recourse mechanism for victims of human rights violations associated with projects supported by international financial institutions (IFIs), and directs U.S. representatives at IFIs to consider human rights and corruption risks before agreeing to support a proposed project. The delegates will learn about the history of the Chixoy Dam Massacre, the connections to similar extractive resource projets in Guatemala, and the potential impacts of the Chixoy International Financial Institution Reparations Act. Lunch provided during meeting.

- 2:30 7:30 pm: View Guatemalan Presidential Inauguration [5]
 - Oue to delays in the inauguration and concerns about the safety of the delegates, the delegates viewed the Guatemalan Presidential inauguration from the hotel, sharing analysis and updates as the unexpected process developed. The delegates were in contact with the US embassy in Guatemala for advice and analysis as the day evolved.
