In 2017, the Foundation pledged \$100 million towards the elimination of global malnutrition. ECF has provided ICCF with a grant to underwrite the cost of this trip and did not have a role in selecting House travelers.







Dr. Mohanjeet Brar will brief the delegation on the role of sustainable tourism in supporting conservation. The delegation will gain a better understanding of the ecotourism models in Kenya and the economic opportunities presented for local communities, which will inform participants' work in Congress on conservation and natural resource issues. Mohanjeet started his career as the Managing Director of Gamewatchers Safaris & Porini Camps in 2005. In 2019, he became a Trustee of the Wildlife Habitat Trust and a Board Member of the Kenya Tourism Board. Mohanjeet also served as a Board Member of the Maasai Mara Wildlife Conservancies Association from 2013 to 2021. In 2021, he co-founded Earthacre and became a Board Member of the African Wildlife Foundation, the Kenya Association of Tour Operators, and the African Conservation Center. Overall, Mohanjeet Brar has held various leadership positions and contributed significantly to the tourism and conservation sectors.

The delegation will visit health and education programs supported by the community conservancy model. The visits will showcase how conservation is supporting human development and inform participants' work on conservation and food security, demonstrating how ecotourism can support development and reduce poverty and food insecurity.



The Digital Learning Project is a collaborative effort with WiLearn 4 Life, backed by the PD Foundation, with a mission to empower the community with digital and tech skills.

The Empowering Girls Program is a partnership with Gamewatchers Safaris and PadMad, a Kenyan social enterprise, to tackle period poverty through the provision of a sustainable solution: reusable sanitary towels. In addition to supplying these eco-friendly pads, the organization offers comprehensive education on Menstrual Health Management and Sexual and Reproductive Health Rights to underprivileged and marginalized communities. The sanitary towels are stitched in rural Kenyan communities using locally sourced materials, thereby not only meeting a crucial need but also empowering marginalized women through employment opportunities.

16:00 - 18:30

Field briefing with conservancy representatives to introduce the delegation to the Maasai Mara ecosystem

Conservancy representatives will brief the delegation on the Maasai Mara ecosystem en route through the conservancy. This will inform participants on the types and density of fauna and flora found in the conservancies and the larger ecosystem, which will lay a foundation for later discussions on how conservation of these natural assets supports Kenya's development.

The Maasai Mara is Kenya's most important wildlife and tourism area. Roughly 25% of Kenya's wildlife resides within the greater Maasai Mara region, a 4,500 km² wildlife landscape comprised of the 1,510 km² Maasai Mara National Reserve (MMNR) and 3,000 km² of adjacent community and private lands. This area includes the key dry season range for the largest animal migration left on Earth.

18:30 - 19:00

Return to camp

19:00 - 21:30

Dinner briefing on critical landscape conservation, including protected areas management and other effective area-based conservation measures (OECMs) like the Maasai Mara conservancies

ICCF staff will lead a discussion on management challenges of protected areas and OECMs and explore partnership models that make these areas effective. Participants will learn, broadly, how each of these models operate and how they support short and long-term sustainability throughout the continent. This discussion will inform participants' work on conservation and natural resources by illustrating how different models are successful in their respective contexts.

Protected areas are widely recognized as the "anchors" to any effort to preserve and regenerate nature and restore ecosystems for the benefit of wildlife, human well-being, and Africa's economies. Yet, most African



countries lack the funding and capacity necessary to effectively manage protected areas.

OECMs are defined as "a geographically defined area other than a Protected Area, which is governed and managed in ways that achieve positive and sustained long-term outcomes for the in situ conservation of biodiversity, with associated ecosystem functions and services and, where applicable, cultural, spiritual, socioeconomic, and other locally relevant values."

Thursday, October 10th

06:30 - 09:00 Field briefing to observe predator activity and discuss human-wildlife conflict

Conservancy representatives will guide participants to track lion pride movements, discussing, en route, the important role lions and other predators play in the ecosystem as well as the Maasai's historical relationship with lions and present threats of human-wildlife conflict. This discussion will provide participants with key background information and observations on how predators, in particular, support the overall health of the ecosystem on human-wildlife conflict, traditional practices of indigenous groups, and the challenges these create for local buy-in to ecotourism as a development solution.

09:00 - 10:30 Breakfast and field briefing with Senior Warden Simon Nkoi, a Maasai from the community who leads the Ol Kinyei Conservancy management on the ground.

Simon Nkoi will brief the delegation on Ol Kinyei's management and operations, as well as its successes and challenges. The discussion will provide participants with the warden's unique perspectives as a community member with respect to his conservancy, which will also inform later discussions with the MMWCA on the broader conservancy model.

10:30 - 11:00 Return to camp

11:30 - 13:30 Lunch with Daniel Sopia, CEO of the Maasai Mara Wildlife Conservancies Association (MMWCA)

Daniel Sopia will brief the delegation on the community conservancy model employed around the Maasai Mara, including its history, the unique ownership and land-use rights associated with it, and the direct support they are receiving from USAID. This discussion will further inform participants' work on conservation and natural resources, illustrating how



the conservancy model generates sustainable incomes for individual landowners.

The Maasai Mara Wildlife Conservancies Association is a membership organization of the Mara Conservancies established in 2013. They have a mandate from landowners and tourism parties to play an overarching coordination role for Greater Mara Ecosystem stakeholders. Currently, they have a membership of 24 conservancies at different stages of development, covering about 450,000 acres. The member conservancies bring together over 15,000 landowners who annually receive approximately 7.5 Million paid as lease fees.

13:30 - 15:00 Afternoon Break. No activities are planned at this time, and members of the delegation will have an opportunity to rest before evening activities.

15:00 - 18:00 Field briefing and visit to a local boma (Maasai homestead) to see one of the lion-proof enclosures and discuss with community members, led by Sammy Ole Mpusia, the community liaison officer.

Sammy Ole Mpusia was instrumental in setting up the Ol Kinyei conservancy 19 years ago and getting community buy-in, which is still an ongoing process. He will brief the delegation about cost-effective solutions, like the lion-proof enclosures, to mitigating these conflicts, as well as ways in which conservation benefits humans living in proximity to parks and protected areas. For participants, this discussion will build on the morning's observations to see how the communities are tangibly addressing these challenges.

Human-wildlife conflict is a serious obstacle to wildlife conservation worldwide and is becoming more prevalent as human population increases, development expands, and other human and environmental factors put people and wildlife in greater direct competition for a shrinking resource base.

18:00 - 19:00 Return to camp

19:00 - 20:30 Dinner briefing with Viraj Sikand, CEO of EarthAcre

Viraj Sikand will brief the delegation on efforts to expand nature-based economic opportunities for the Mara conservancies. Participants will learn how markets for conservation credits can provide additional income streams to communities, further illustrating how conservation can support development and reduce poverty and food insecurity.

EarthAcre pairs community knowledge with technology to ensure landowners are paid for their role in the protection of nature. EarthAcre works with communities and local partners to implement regenerative and



sustaining activities on the land. Biodiversity assets are measured through on-ground and spatial technologies, and payments are distributed from the markets equitably, transparently and directly to individuals for their sustainable contributions as part of the community.

Friday, October 11th

- 07:00 - 08:00 Breakfast briefing at the camp on combating wildlife trafficking (CWT)
- ICCF representatives will lead a discussion of global efforts to combat wildlife trafficking. As both populations and economies have grown in East Asia, the demand for wildlife products has surged, sending the black-market price of ivory, rhino horn, and other products to historic highs. Poaching and wildlife trafficking in Africa are destabilizing economies, decimating iconic species, financing violent insurgent groups and international criminal organizations, contributing to the deterioration of governance, and creating large swaths of land in which insurgent groups can train and operate. The delegation will learn about the poaching risks facing conservation areas as well as recent legislative and policy successes in Kenya and the region.*
- 08:00 - 10:00 Field briefing with conservancy representatives to learn about wildlife tracking methods and their application for conservation, including combating poaching. The delegation will also learn about the process and training to become a guide or ranger in Kenya and the opportunities these roles create for local employment.
- 10:00 - 10:30 Transfer to Youth Beekeeping Initiative
- 10:30 - 11:30 Visit Youth Beekeeping Initiative
- The delegation will visit the Youth Beekeeping Initiative, which teaches local youth to harvest honey from hives that help local bee populations. Participants will learn how the initiative provides youth with livelihood and incomes for their communities.*
- 11:30 - 12:00 Return to camp
- 12:00 - 13:30 Lunch with Dr. John Sankok, CEO of Community Health Partners (CHP)
- Dr. Sankok will brief the delegation on CHP's health and community development programs. The delegation will learn how these programs work in tandem with the conservancy model to support human development in the communities. Community Health Partners has been on the forefront of healthcare since 1980, and played an especially big role during the*



COVID-19 pandemic. They work on two fronts: primary health care services and community development initiatives. Their overall strategic plan is to contribute to the delivery of quality, accessible, and affordable health services.

13:30 - 15:00

Afternoon Break. No activities are planned at this time, and members of the delegation will have an opportunity to rest before evening activities.

15:00 - 18:00

Field briefing in the neighboring Mara Ripoi conservancy, to see a vital corridor linking habitats, which is key to restore biodiversity and ensure healthy ecosystems for the wildlife and Maasai people.

Conservancy representatives will brief the delegation, en route through Mara Ripoi, on the importance of connecting wildlife migration routes. Sixty-five percent of wildlife live outside of Kenya's protected areas, so the success of the conservancy model is not only in income generation for individual landowners but also in connecting land for wildlife in the buffer area around the Maasai Mara National Reserve. In visiting a neighboring conservancy, the delegation will observe how wildlife can thrive in this environment, which will further inform their work on conservation and natural resources.

The Mara has traditionally dealt with fencing put up by landowners trying to protect their land and livestock. The Mara is home to the migration of many of Africa's iconic species, namely the wildebeest migration. The fencing in the region disrupts the migration patterns, which leads to the animals being disoriented and/or trapped. The conservancy model has worked with local landowners to reduce the amount of fencing through education, livestock, and land leasing programs.

19:00 - 20:30

Dinner briefing on global biodiversity and habitat loss, land use change, and environmental migration

ICCF representatives will lead a discussion on global biodiversity loss and its implications. More than one million species may be in danger of extinction this century, creating grave threats to human health, well-being, food security, regional stability, and continued economic success. Africa is the most vulnerable continent to the impacts of these changes, subject to increasing frequency and severity of natural disasters, unpredictable rainfall, and widespread crop failure. An estimated 36 million people across Africa are displaced, mostly from conflict. This number has tripled since 2011, representing 44% of the global total.

This discussion will tie together information learned on the trip, more closely examine linkages to broader global issues, and include a discussion of various development mechanisms available to finance global



conservation efforts and how these efforts can work in tandem.

Pursuant to House Rule 25, clause 5(d)(2), the Committee on Ethics hereby approves your proposed trip to Kenya,¹ scheduled for October 5 to 13, 2024, sponsored by the International Conservation Caucus Foundation and Eleanor Crook Foundation.

Committee travel regulations require that you submit your complete pre-trip approval request to the Committee at least 30 days before the commencement of the trip or it will not be granted. Despite your failure to do so in this instance, we are approving your current request. However, any future requests must adhere to the 30-day requirement or they will be denied.

You must complete an Employee Post-Travel Disclosure Form (which your employing Member must also sign) and file it, together with a Sponsor Post-Travel Disclosure Form completed by the trip sponsor, with the Clerk of the House within 15 days after your return from travel. As part of that filing, you are also required to attach a copy of this letter and both the Traveler and Primary Trip Sponsor Forms (including attachments) you previously submitted to the Committee in seeking pre-approval for this trip. If you are required to file an annual Financial Disclosure Statement, you must also report all travel expenses totaling more than \$480 from a single source on the "Travel" schedule of your annual Financial Disclosure Statement covering this calendar year. Finally, Travel Regulation § 404(d) also requires you to keep a copy of all request forms and supporting information provided to the Committee for three subsequent Congresses from the date of travel.

Because the trip may involve meetings with foreign government representatives, we note that House employees may accept, under the Foreign Gifts and Decorations Act (FGDA), gifts "of minimal value [currently \$480] tendered as a souvenir or mark of courtesy" by a foreign government. Any tangible gifts valued in excess of minimal value received from a foreign government must, within 60 days of acceptance, be disclosed on a Form for Disclosing Gifts
