



Dear Mr. Koya:

Pursuant to House Rule 25, clause 5(d)(2), the Committee on Ethics hereby approves your proposed trip to Jordan and Israel,¹ scheduled for October 18 to 28, 2024, sponsored by Rebuilding Alliance and Rotary Club Woodside Portola Valley Foundation.

Committee travel regulations require that you submit your complete pre-trip approval request to the Committee at least 30 days before the commencement of the trip or it will not be granted. Despite your failure to do so in this instance, we are approving your current request. However, any future requests must adhere to the 30-day requirement or they will be denied.

You must complete an Employee Post-Travel Disclosure Form (which your employing Member must also sign) and file it, together with a Sponsor Post-Travel Disclosure Form completed by the trip sponsor, with the Clerk of the House within 15 days after your return from travel. As part of that filing, you are also required to attach a copy of this letter and both the Traveler and Primary Trip Sponsor Forms (including attachments) you previously submitted to the Committee in seeking pre-approval for this trip. If you are required to file an annual Financial Disclosure Statement, you must also report all travel expenses totaling more than \$480 from a single source on the "Travel" schedule of your annual Financial Disclosure Statement covering this calendar year. Finally, Travel Regulation § 404(d) also requires you to keep a copy of all request forms and supporting information provided to the Committee for three subsequent Congresses from the date of travel.

Because the trip may involve meetings with foreign government representatives, we note that House employees may accept, under the Foreign Gifts and Decorations Act (FGDA), gifts "of minimal value [currently \$480] tendered as a souvenir or mark of courtesy" by a foreign government. Any tangible gifts valued in excess of minimal value received from a foreign government must, within 60 days of acceptance, be disclosed on a Form for Disclosing Gifts

¹ Please be aware that the Committee's review of the proposed trip does not extend to either the security situation in the destination country or security related to foreign travel in general. StaffDel Leadership Learning Mission 9.0 to Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Amman October 18th-28th, 2024

A constituent accompanied trip

MISSION GOALS: The overall goal of this Leadership Learning Mission is to explore how the peaceful aspirations of all can be furthered when Palestinians and Israelis both enjoy the benefits of equal rights and how U.S. policy and aid can support those aspirations, especially exploring how to assure the health and safety of children and families. Travelers will visit sites and cities of cultural, social, historical, and political significance to better understand this region of the world, and consider the implications of American policies in the region.

RELEVANCE TO OFFICIAL DUTIES: While always prioritizing safety, the Leadership Learning Mission will offer senior staff the opportunity to further their understanding of this region of the world and to learn the implications of American policies in the region, to better support constituents.

This fact-finding trip will:

- Provide participants with an understanding of the history of Jerusalem, the West Bank, Gaza, and Jordan
- Develop their understanding of the challenges faced by all in this time of crisis through meetings with community leaders, human rights experts, U.S. embassy officials, and decision maker, as well as doctors, medical groups, and front-line personnel at aid agencies to understand the challenges of assuring emergency relief especially in Gaza
- Consider the implications and impact of Israeli control of building and planning rights in East Jerusalem and the West Bank and explore successful ways to prevent the demolition of, and help in the sustainable development of, Palestinian homes, schools, water systems, and communities, especially in at-risk neighborhoods;
- Visit Palestinians and Israelis who are providing emergency response and who work for peace and justice to understand the challenges they are facing now, learn about their efforts to address those challenges, consider what Congress is uniquely able to do to support such efforts, and how this makes a difference; and
- Show how U.S. aid and intervention benefits the health and safety of children and families in Gaza, the West Bank, and Israel.

LOCATION: The purpose of travel to Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Amman is to give Senior staff the opportunity to see the evolving facts on the ground, attend on-site meetings, and where possible, to hear from Palestinians and Israelis working together to keep neighborhoods standing and safeguard human rights.

Of Note: In the West Bank and Jerusalem, Holy Land Trust is the tour operator selected by Rebuilding Alliance to implement this fact-finding mission. Elias D'eis and Itamar Shappira are the Tour Guides. In Jordan, RA is working with Apollo Travel.

Our partner in the planning of this delegation, the Holy Land Trust, funded and assisted in the rebuilding of the family's home. Recent demolitions took place in mid-July, targeting the Al-Araj family. Delegation will meet with these families as well. MISSION GOALS: The overall goal of this Leadership Learning Mission is to explore how the peaceful aspirations of all can be furthered when Palestinians and Israelis both enjoy the benefits of equal rights and how U.S. policy and aid can support those aspirations, especially exploring how to assure the health and safety of children and families. Travelers will visit sites and cities of cultural, social, historical, and political significance to better understand this region of the world, and consider the implications of American policies in the region.

- Consider the implications and impact of Israeli control of building and planning rights in East Jerusalem and the West Bank and explore successful ways to prevent the demolition of, and help in the sustainable development of, Palestinian homes, schools, water systems, and communities, especially in at-risk neighborhoods;
- Visit Palestinians and Israelis who are providing emergency response and who work for peace and justice to understand the challenges they are facing now, learn about their efforts to address those challenges, consider what Congress is uniquely able to do to support such efforts, and how this makes a difference; and
- Show how U.S. aid and intervention benefits the health and safety of children and families in Gaza, the West Bank, and Israel.

LOCATION: The purpose of travel to Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Amman is to give senior House and Senate staff the opportunity to see the evolving facts on the ground, attend on-site meetings, and where possible, to hear from Palestinians and Israelis working together to keep neighborhoods standing and safeguard human rights.

Of Note: Both a Palestinian and an Israeli join as tour guides for the trip for the West Bank and Israeli portions of the trip. In Jordan, a Jordanian tour guide joined the trip.
