





John Gantt, President of ICCF and CEO of the ICCF Group, will provide an overview of congressional conservation leadership (the International Conservation and Oceans Caucuses). He will also describe the expansion of the caucus model around the world, including in the UK, Africa, Asia, and Latin America, and the opportunities for dialogue between parliamentary conservation caucuses in 20+ countries.

Mismanaged protected areas, especially in Africa, Latin America, and Southeast Asia, can be a haven for not only poaching and habitat destruction, but also gangs, drug cartels, and terrorist networks that foster regional violence and instability. By funding effective management of protected and conserved areas over the next decade, driving good



governance and inclusive development, the USFIC can serve as a vital tool for the U.S. to repel the influence of malign actors in the developing world.

**Roundtable: The Future of International Conservation - Principles and Priorities for U.S. Investment**

Conference participants will take part in a roundtable discussion on the role that foreign assistance for international conservation can play in making the United States more secure, stable, and prosperous. As part of this conversation, ICCF staff will provide an overview of historical and recent U.S. investment in conservation through mechanisms such as the Department of State, the Development Finance Corporation (DFC), the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, the U.S. Forest Service, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and the Global Environment Facility (GEF), among others; opportunities for 21st Century conservation; and how these investments support U.S. national and economic security.

**Site Visit: Center for Birds of Prey and Avian Medical Clinic**



Participants will have the opportunity to learn more about key avian species as they follow natural paths accentuated with subtle interpretive signage and aviaries housing nearly 50 species of eagles, falcons, hawks, owls, kites, vultures, and other birds of prey from all parts of the world.

The Avian Medical Clinic operates 365 days a year and currently admits between 800-1000 patients each year, representing a variety of birds of prey and shorebird species with injuries ranging from minor to critical.

Constructed with a grant from U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and South Carolina Department of Natural Resources, the Center's combined-use Avian Medical Center / SC Oiled Bird Treatment Facility was completed in October 2007 and is the only permanent avian treatment center of its kind on the Eastern seaboard.

*Throughout the visit, participants will have a chance to discuss the importance of species conservation as a pillar of U.S. foreign policy, which will inform their work as members of the International Conservation Caucus.*

**Dinner Briefing: Conservation and National Security**

Over dinner, participants will participate in a discussion of the role of good natural resource management and efforts to combat environmental crime in fostering peace and security.

Communities across the globe depend on nature for vital ecosystem services: clean air and clean water, food, energy, medicine, and resilience against extreme weather and disease. The loss of and resulting competition for scarce natural resources often impact vulnerable populations the hardest, producing desperate circumstances that can lead to and exacerbate conflict and insurgency. Competition over critical natural resources has been a constant driver of conflict throughout history. Over the past 60 years, 40 percent of civil wars can be associated with natural resources. Since 2010, violent civil conflict has tripled, and forced emigration has reached a record high, according to the United Nations. In a vicious cycle, conflict also often drives mass displacement, puts added pressure on neighboring regions, and can catalyze international mass migration.

**09:00 - 10:30 Roundtable Breakfast: International Food Security, Deforestation, and U.S. Security Interests**

ICCF staff will lead a discussion of the links between conservation, agriculture and forestry, food security, and global stability. Land degradation includes soil erosion, salinization, pollution, nutrient depletion, and loss of soil fertility, and is often driven by agricultural expansion, deforestation and biodiversity loss, increasing human and livestock populations, and unsustainable use. According to the World Food Programme, up to 50 million people are on the brink of famine, and over 13 million children suffer from severe malnutrition. These dire conditions can lead to mass migration, conflict, and insurgency, requiring international intervention. In a cyclical scenario, war also impacts global food systems. Improved food systems and agricultural practices can help countries become more food independent and less reliant on global food supply chains.

The illegal extraction of resources, including forest products, is not only an environmental issue but often goes hand-in-hand with other illegal activities, including money laundering, human and drug trafficking, labor abuse, and terrorism. Proceeds from this illicit trade can help finance transnational criminal organizations and militant groups, often with ties to U.S. adversaries. Illegally extracted resources also undercut legal markets, competing with companies that abide by widely accepted regulatory frameworks and laws.
