Panel 5 – Batteries on a Wartime Footing: Reclaiming Control of America’s Energy Storage Supply Chain

Batteries underpin America’s transportation systems, critical infrastructure, and defense-adjacent industries, yet U.S. supply-chain security is increasingly shaped by foreign control of refining and processing rather than access to raw materials alone. 
